The Rev. Canon Charlotte Cleghorn to Retire from Centers for Christian Studies

Dear All Souls Family,

In November I sent an e-mail to those of you on the list serve about my decision to leave the Centers for Christian Studies on March 15, 2010 but I realized from talking with many of you that I was not clear about what I was really doing. The fact of the matter is, I am retiring. "You're too young," some have said. Granted, I am not 65 but I am over 60!

When I appeared in your midst in September, 2005, most of you had no idea who I was and what I was doing here. Now that I am preparing to move into my next phase of life, I'd like to give you some background to my professional life that has brought me to this point.

In 1973, two years after I graduated from college, I went to seminary, and graduated in 1975 with a Master of Religious Education. I had felt called to ordination since I was a child but was unable to pursue that call because of my gender. For four years I worked as the Eastern New England Director of FOCUS, a ministry that works with private school students. From there, I went to Gov. Dummer Academy, now called the Governor's Academy in Byfield, MA, founded in 1763, as the school chaplain where I taught, coached, advised, and oversaw the spiritual life of the community.

It was during that time that I felt the call to finally begin the ordination process and in 1984, went to Virginia Theological Seminary where I spent two years and received my Master of Divinity. (Todd and I were at VTS at the same time.) After my ordination in Boston in 1986, I went to St. Paul's, Cleveland Hts., Ohio. From there, to Windham, ME where I was the rector of St. Ann's Church for 6 ½ years.

Lee Arnold can make money and sweet potatoes go long, long way

(EDITOR'S NOTE: This is another in a series of profiles of parishioners who have received the God's Hands Award for service to the church.)

Lee Arnold was treasurer and otherwise managed the financial affairs of All Souls for more than 30 years, beginning in the early 1960s. He and his late wife, Laurie, did the office work when there was no office and no Warner Building. They often took work home in this era before computers.

Lee crunched numbers and Laurie, he said, "Did the nitty gritty" of otherwise manning the office. Moneywise, this was a time of "touch and go" for church income and expenditures. Lee recalls, "Neil Zabriskie said at such times, 'The Lord will provide.' And always, somebody did kick in."

Lee is a native of Michigan, a World War II navy veteran, a graduate of Michigan State University and a Certified Public Accountant (CPA). The manufacturing company he worked for, Air Control Products, Inc., moved operations to Asheville in 1960.

After only a year, the company moved back to Michigan, but Lee and Laurie chose to make their home in Asheville. They bought a house near the municipal golf course. Lee went to work for American Enka, a huge textiles corporation, where he was in charge of internal auditing.

After six years, he joined Matthews Ford Company on Biltmore Avenue as controller and office manager and worked there about 25 years until retiring. In retirement, Laurie worked as a volunteer with Asheville-Buncombe Community Christian Ministries. Lee served as a docent at All Souls.

From the Dean: Epiphany: Illumination

The lights came out of nowhere. I was riding my bike home late one summer evening when they arose. They were behind me and they were growing. They were like nothing I had ever seen before. I began to pound the pedals of my bike while also looking back to make some sense of what was emerging behind me. Was this some kind of alien visitation? A tearing of open of the sky? (I was raised on Rod Sterling's "The Twilight Zone") I tore through an open field to our street desperately seeking the safety of our house. By now the lights had taken over about a third of the night time horizon. I forsook the 'bikes are always put in the garage' rule dumping my bike in the yard as I leapt onto the front porch and through our front door. From the safety of the house I began to call for my parents.



I had never seen the Northern Lights before. Their luminous throbbing of greenish, bluish, white light was an amazing display of nature's serendipity. As they danced through the summer night sky, it was as if we were being given a gift during the hot and humid dog days of summer.

Epiphany: a season when things are seen, revealed, when light emerges in new ways, beautiful even if at times frightening. Who is this One who is emerging among us? He did what at Cana, water into what? From where does this healing come? Those long endured demons are fleeing? Having stood in the expectancy of Advent, we now begin to take in the illumination.

2 Light comes in many forms: sunlight, moonlight, fire, comments from friends, words emerging from texts, thoughts and understandings which

emerge as we are still with ourselves. As a community we gather to listen and proclaim where it is we are seeing the growing light. We gather around ritual fires, we hear ancient texts and listen for their insight into our time and place.

Perhaps it is the growing daylight that makes this time of year welcome. Perhaps it is the fires which gather and warm. My sense is Jesus had the same effect on folks. A bit frightening in his unpredictability, a bit unnerving to watch the process of demons being exorcised, and yet the freedom which arose, the connection that reached forth, the welcome one found offered in their own soul; there was a salience about his growing presence which many found irresistible.

It is our task this season to gather ourselves before this emerging One. Once again we are called to form around the texts, both ancient and current, that offer a growing illumination. The revealing may come in the growing darkness of night or it may come in a brilliant display of radiance. Epiphany will reveal what is already present.

Then I headed to southern California to spend a year on the staff of the Center for Spiritual Development, run by the Sisters of St. Joseph of Orange.

I was asked by the bishop in Los Angeles to be part of a pastoral care team at St. George's, Laguna Hills after the rector had been inhibited. I stayed for several years and then wandered to North Carolina after a year of camping, visiting friends and family and exploring the country at a leisurely pace.

Upon my arrival in Hendersonville in 2002, I became the interim at St. James, Hendersonville for almost two years and then to Holy Family, Mills River for about 8 months. Then I came here to be the director of the Centers for Christian Studies, a ministry of the Cathedral and of the Diocese. It has been exciting and challenging to get this work off the ground and I am encouraged by the response there has been over the past 4+ years. And, now I find myself at the threshold of a new phase of my life.

Being part of this community liturgically has been a great gift to me and I thank you. I am staying in the area—this is home. I will be away from All Souls for a time but you will be present to me nonetheless.

Thank you for how you welcomed me into this wonderful community. Sunday, March 14 will be my last Sunday for a while but I'll see you again.

Marilynne Robinson's *Gilead*

But it is in this mesmerizing account—in the form of a letter to his young son, who he imagines reading it when he is grown—that his meditations on creation and existence are fully illumined."—from Publishers Weekly

Laurie was an avid gardener and Lee joined in her efforts. After 21 years in the Beverly Hills neighborhood, they bought 6 acres in Fairview with a good garden plot. Far ahead of their time, they built a solar house which was partially heated by the attached garden greenhouse.

From the greenhouse, they developed a strategy that could feed the world with sweet potatoes. It went like this, Lee explains: They cut a single sweet potato in half and planted both halves in the greenhouse. As sprouts formed, they broke them off and planted the sprouts in the garden. Sprouts formed again – and well, you get the idea. "We grew some beautiful sweet potatoes," Lee said.

The Arnolds' country place was once on a tour-of-homes because of its unique heating system and the state-of-the-art gardening.

Laurie died in 1996 and a lot of the fun went out of gardening for Lee. Lee and Laurie had two daughters, Debbie, who lives in Boone; Amy, who died; and a son, Leander, who lives next door to Lee in Fairview.

Down on the Arnold farm there is a garage and in the garage is a shiny red 1965 Ford Mustang with 86,000 miles on it. Lee drives it occasionally, but never in the rain, never in the snow and "very little in the sun." He might drive it to All Souls' services one day.

The 2009 CROP Walk in Asheville/Buncombe County did not meet the \$30,000 goal it set for itself - - - and that is the bad news. The good news is that it did raise \$28,410 and that was a marvelous accomplishment in a "down economy" and a much better

result that in recent years! Thank you All Souls, for your support of the project and the contribution of about \$1800 to the effort.

75% of funds raised go to Church World Service to fund international relief efforts while the remainder (\$7,102.50) stays right here in our neighborhood to be divided among Loving Food Resources, Meals on Wheels, MANNA, and ABCCM.

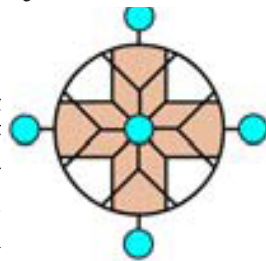
